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Chapleau Curling wraps up for another year

the Knights of Columbus in January and the MNR in February. These will provide a big boost for our club, and for the community at large with over 50 out of town teams.

A big thank you to our Curling Executive and the many volunteers who put in countless hours installing, maintaining and removing the ice, preparing and serving food, bartending, cleaning after bonspiels, and conducting day to day business.

Hughes Optimistic After Briefing And Tour Of Derailment Site

White River residents are relieved there has been significant progress cleaning the train derailment that led to an oil spill near that community last week, says Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing MP, Carol Hughes.

Hughes met

with Mayor and Council Monday before touring the site with CP officials and the team of specialists assembled to deal with the multiple challenges arising from the accident.

"The Mayor and Council indicated that they were satisfied with the progress on the site," said Hughes. "I was told they've had nothing but cooperation from CP and feel the relationship is defined by open lines of communication."

After visiting the scene, Hughes feels confident that all entities involved are working together to ensure the best resolu-

tion from this derailment.

"The site is somewhat remote and the initial work of containment has to be followed by removing the cars which meant building a road to the rail line," said Hughes. "What I found encouraging was that environmental monitoring was set up immediately."

Hughes has been in contact with her provincial counterpart, Algoma-Manitoulin MPP, Michael Mantha, since the derailment occurred.

"We share the information we

receive so that we can work in an organized way," said Hughes. "I am confident that this

is being handled in a professional manner which gives me hope that the impact will be

as minimal as possible in this particular situation."

Moments from the past

Eyewitness Submitted by Larry Carroll (From the Beaver Magazine May 2005)

I was interested in the article about the origins of northern humour on page 21 of your October/ November 2004 issue, especially the paragraph about the wolf attacking the section man. I was the front-end trainman of the train involved.

Being on the engine when the engineer applied the brakes, I asked why he

was stopping, and he said, "There's a section man fighting with a wolf." So he backed up to the spot. I hit the wolf on the head with pick, and fireman J. Green hit it with the shaker bar. This finished the wolf.

My understanding of the episode was that Mike Dusiak was patrolling on his velocipede when he took it off the rails to let our train go by. While

waiting on the right of way between track-and-bush, the emaciated wolf jumped him. Mike had lost his hatchet and had only a dead branch in his hand to fend off the wolf. When we came upon them, both were winded. We put the wolf on the cowcatcher and took it to Chapleau about twelve miles away, where we notified V. Crichton of the Lands and Forests

Department, who immediately walked to Poulin to verify the story by observing the foot and animal tracks before it snowed again. He wrote an account of it in the Journal of Manunalogy [Vol 28, No 3. August 1947]. It can be found in the library of the National Archives in Ottawa.

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

Chapleau Moments

The Kirkland Lake Blue Devils, one of the strongest teams in the Northland Intermediate Hockey League (NIHL) came to the Moore Arena for a Sunday afternoon match up with the Chapleau Huskies in November 1978, and it was fitting that David McAdam, the team's first goaltender was between the pipes for the team's first shutout in its history.

David earned his shutout in a 10-0 romp over the visitors as the Huskies made few mistakes as they

went on a scoring spree, leading the Blue Devils 3-0 at the end of the first period, 6-0 when the second closed and adding four more for good measure in the third.

It was the Blue Devils first season in the NIHL and they were in first place. They eventually defeated the Huskies for the league championship.

David had been part of the team's history since it was established in the 1974-75 season and then entered the NIHL

in 1975-76. He was part of the successful David Mizuguchi-David Futhey Bantams teams, then played for the Junior 'B' Huskies of the International Junior 'B' Hockey League when Earle Freeborn was the coach.

Interestingly, after his career as a goaltender, he ended his hockey playing days as a forward, playing in the town league in the 1980s.


It was a very successful weekend for the locals as they defeated the Calvert GMs 12-6 in a Saturday night encounter at the Moore Arena.

More team history was made on the weekend as Paul Scheer, who was the league's Rookie of the Year in 1977-78 and set a league record for

most assists, notched hat tricks in both games, while rookie Alan Morin scored his first Intermediate 'A' goal assisted by Dave Baker and Dave McMillan against the Calvert GMs.

Against the GMs, other goal scorers were Paul with two more and Alan, were Moe Poirier, John Simon with two, John Tavella with two, Bill Scheer, Dave McMillan and Tom McCrea.

Against the Blue Devils, the Huskies made few mistakes in their netbuster of a weekend with Dave Baker opening the scoring assisted by McMillan and Bill Scheer, with Paul Scheer notching his first of the game from Ron Larcher and Ted Zajac and Pat



Swanson from Zajac and Ted Swanson making it 3-0 at the end of the first.

In the second Simon scored from Bill Scheer and Keith McAdam, then it was Bill again from assisted by George Card and Keith McAdam, followed by McMillan from Pat Swanson and Baker.

The scoring spree continued in the third as McMillan started it off with one from Card and Baker while Pat Swanson followed with assists going to brother Ted and Larcher.

Paul Scheer capped off his highly successful goal scoring weekend of hat tricks in both games with the final two goals with Larcher and McCrea assisting.

A Chapleau Sentinel report on the two games said it wasn't just a matter of winning two hockey games or scoring 22


goals, each player was a star in his own way and was a real morale booster for the team.

The only dark side was the loss of Jamie Doyle, one of the keenest players who was injured in the game against the Calvert GMs and had to be hospitalized. However, his injury was not serious.

Joy (Evans) Heft kindly sent me the photo of a Chapleau hockey team from early 1950s, and I am sharing it with you this week. In it you will see some great Chapleau stars from that era, with Ross Thornton as coach and D.O. (Ovide) Payette as manager. Mr. Payette played on Chapleau teams in the early 1900s. Probe Mines stands out among peers with wide-scale exploration potential at Borden Lake project, says broker

Casimir Capital reiterated its speculative buy rating and \$4.25 price target on Probe Mines (TSE:PRB) Tuesday, after the company's recently-completed winter ice drilling program at the Borden Lake project in Ontario revealed wider-scale exploration potential and high-grade gold intercepts.

The company noted in a release Tuesday that in total, results for 19 holes were received and were successful in identifying high-grade gold mineralization 500 metres along-strike from the previous limits of the deposit.

It also said results showed expansion of the near surface

mineralization to the northwest, and continued high-grade intercepts in the southeast high-grade zone. Infill drilling also returned high-grade mineralization in the southeast section, suggesting that the high-grade zone may extend further in a northwest direction than previously indicated, Probe

added.

Casimir analyst Ryan Walker said that two holes from the ice-based, step-out drilling in the southeast section both cut wide intervals of high-grade gold, suggesting continuity of the higher-grade mineralization toward the southeast. Results from three other holes in the area are pending. Highlights from the holes in the southeast section include hole 378, which returned 44 metres at 2.9 grams per tonne (g/t) gold, including 25 metres at

4.6 g/t gold, and 12.9 metres of 7.4 g/t gold.

In the northwest extension, the analyst pointed out that two step-out holes expanded shallow mineralization to the northwest of the previous deposit limits.

Walker also noted that infill drilling on the Main deposit continues to confirm overall deposit continuity and improve grades. Recent results included hole 374, which returned 49 metres at 2.3 g/t gold, including 15 metres at

5.7 g/t gold and hole 366, which cut 60 metres of 1.2 g/t gold, including 4 metres at 4.5 g/t gold.

"We contend that the latest results demonstrate the immediate and wider-scale exploration potential at the project, and should see the shares command a premium to the peers," Walker remarked.

"This is especially so as Probe continues to delineate higher grade material, helping it stand out from its peers."
