Twenty year forest management plan for Superior-Martel forest

A very successful open house was held at the Legion Hall on April 26th, to provide the public with supplement on talinformation concerning a proposed 20 year planoutlining forest management for the surrounding area.

The doors were open from 2:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. as constant stream of community members came out to take part in the process.

The invitation was extended by the MNR, Tembec, and the Superior-Martel Forest Local Citizens Committee (LCC), to provide an opportunity to review and comment on forest management with respect to the uniting of the Superior and the Martel forest.

In regard to responsibilities for the forest management plan, Tembec is responsible for maintaining forest resources as well as preparing, monitoring and complying with the approved plan.

The Ministry of Natural Resources is responsible for reviewing, approving, and ensuring compliance with the plan. The Local Citizens Committee

(LCC) has a primary role of identifying potential issues, which may cause conflict, so that they can be resolved early in the planning process.

Our local LCC represent recreational users, trappers, snowmobilers, and hardwood users. There is also representation from the Forest Industry and Municipal Council.

The topics of concern were the new roads, which will be needed over the next 20 years, and the areas proposed to be harvested in the first 5 years of the plan.

A large array of maps were on display to outline old and mature growth, fire history, as well as areas eligible for future use. Biologists, Foresters, and First Nation representatives were also on hand during the open house.

The ecollaboration shares a common goal of a Desired Future Forest Condition (DFFC). The desired balance incorporates a healthy forest ecosystem, diverse wildlife habitat, maintenance of existing forest types, and meeting the communities' need for recreation and culture.

In addition to this is the forest's ability to supply local economic opportunity. The forest management plans of both Superior forest and Martel forest have had to merge in merely 4 months. "The aim is to achieve enough wood supply for 3 shifts in the sawmill," expressed Ron Martel, General Manager of Forest Resource Management for Tembec.

There have been specific values identified, which need protection from forest management activities. These values include heritage sites, tourism, nesting, calving, and spawning sites as well as private land and wetlands, just to name a few.

A draft plan will be presented in fall 2005 and a tentative date of May 2006 has been set for the inspection of the MNR-approved plan. The Ministry of Natural Resources welcomes any concerns or requests for additional information to be directed to their District Manager's office at 864-3122.




