Reform Needed for Canada's Retirees

REPORT from **OTTAWA** by **Carol Hughes** Federal member of Parliament Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapuskasing



The current economic crisis has exposed some inadequacies in Canada's safety net for retirees. Shattered pension plans, underperforming stock portfolios and RRSPs, along with the high cost of basics such as heating fuel have pushed more and more seniors to the In Canada, brink. more than 266,000 senior citizens live in poverty. But with a little more government assistance, this reality is preventable

New Democrats are proposing a doubling of the Canada Pension Plans (CPP) and the Quebec Pension Plans (OPP) by increasing the Guaranteed Income Supplement to the tune of 700 million dollars a year. This will ensure that senior's compensation from the government is a guaranteed \$22,000 a year as compared to the current \$11,000 which is barely enough to survive. The goal of this plan is the elimination of senior's poverty in Canada. 93% of Canadians are eligible for the CPP and QPP and receive money that is guaranteed and constant despite factors such as inflation, which commonly eat away at retirement plans kept within banks or private pensions.

With many workers having been prematurely laid off in the past year, coupled with losses to private

"I am pleased that we can now make Avastin more available to colorectal cancer patients. We remain committed to providing more costeffective medication for people in Ontario, and reinvesting our savings in new and better drugs for everyone," said Brown.

The Ontario Public Drug Programs will now cover the cost of Avastin for patients who require the treatment beyond 16

cycles, if medical evidence from a physician indicates there has been no disease progression.

The new criteria, effective immediately, will allow funded treatment of Avastin up to 24 cycles where previously the medication was funded for a maximum of 16 treatment cycles. Treatment with Avastin beyond 24 cycles could still be available on advice from the patient's doctor or oncologist.

Chapleau Post Office vital as daily community meeting place for citizens



For almost 60 years now the Federal Building in Chapleau, commonly referred to as "the post office" has been a focal point of community life, a daily meeting place for citizens to not only pick up and send out mail, but to pass the time of day with friends and neighbours. In reality the post office is the centre of Chapleau, and to read in the Chapleau Express that it may be closed, bothered me immensely, even though I have not lived there for more than 20 years.

I believe that I speak for many of us who have moved from Chapleau, but still consider it home that the post office is much more than the handling of the mail in a small town, with all respect to the people who work there. It is the heart and soul of the community, the daily meeting place, if you will, and all efforts must be made to convince Canada Post and the federal government that it must stay open. I sure lend my voice to the efforts to keep the Chapleau post office right where it is!



Just prior to World War II plans had been made to undertake a federal building in Chapleau at the corner of Birch and Lorne streets and I recall as a youngster that the site had been excavated but nothing happened until 1949. In the 1920s my grandfather George Hunt had a jewelry and watch repair business on the site. I recall telling people as a voungster when we would walk by the partially excavated site in the 1940s, "My grandfather's store used to be there."

Let me turn back the clock for a moment to 1885 when the Canadian Pacific Railway arrived and Chapleau was created as a divisional point out of the wilderness of Northern Ontario. For help in putting it all into perspective for you, I turned to my cousin Michael McMullen, who has written a family history of William and May (Mulligan) McMullen, his grandparents and my great aunt and uncle. My grandmother Lil Chapleau's fifth (Mulligan) Morris and his grandmother were sisters.

Our family was very much involved in the early days of the Chapleau post office with two members having held the position of postmaster.

The first post office in Chapleau was established in the store of T.A. Austin who was the first postmaster from 1886 to 1890. He was followed in the position by J.M Austin, from 1890 to 1892 and then by H. Nicholson from 1892 to 1896. The post office was housed in various locations during this time in stores.

According to Michael's family history, Patrick A. Mulligan, our greatgreat uncle arrived in Chapleau in late 1885, and built a store called Murrays and Mulligan at the northwest corner of Birch and Young Streets which opened in 1886. He became Chapleau's fourth postmaster in 1896 and served until 1913. Michael noted that while serving as postmaster Patrick Mulligan built a small post office which became part of the Boston Cafe.

William McMullen, Michael's grandfather, arrived in Chapleau in 1898 and worked for the CPR whose employ he left in 1913 to become postmaster following the death of Patrick Mulligan, his wife

May's uncle, who had served for 17 years. William was postmaster until mid-1918 when he returned to the CPR and Mrs. George Collinson, the assistant postmaster took over until her husband took over the position upon his return from serving in Canadian forces overseas in World War I. Mr. Collinson was postmaster until 1955 when he retired.

One other location for the post office was in an Austin and Nicholson store on Birch Street. In 1927 the post office moved to a red brick building at 14 Young Street where it remained until the new federal building was opened in 1950. This building was originally a branch of the Traders Bank established in Chapleau in 1909 which amalgamated with the Royal Bank of years. The Chapleau Post of May 5, 1949, reported that Hill Clarke and Francis had been given a contract for the construction of a federal building in Chapleau which J.O. (Ovide) Cote, the secretary treasurer of the Chapleau Liberal Association unofficially confirmed. It was to be built at a total cost of \$165,000 and would have the post office on ground floor and department of Indian Affairs office upstairs. At the time much credit was given to Lester B. Pearson, the member of parliament for Algoma East. Mr. Pearson later became prime minister of Canada.

Opened in 1950, a really modern building for the time, the post office, quickly became an important part of daily community life, as it remains perhaps, in the 21st century the powers that be are putting post offices back in retail stores where they were more than 100 years ago. However, in communities like Chapleau, to close it means that a sense of place is lost that is vital for the citizens and all the number crunchers and politicians in the land will never replace it. Turning back the clock is not the answer. HAPPY BIRTHDAY DR.YOUNG!!!

Ontario Weather Review November 2009

In November, Ontarians enjoyed a record-breaking month in terms of temperatures, especially in the Northern locations. Considering that November is usually grey and wet, we were blessed with plenty of sunshine. Stations recording hours of

sunshine reported numbers approaching record-breaking values. This November the Wiarton weather station recorded 125.2 hours of sunshine, ranking it the sunniest November. Similarly, the Toronto weather station recorded 118.2

hours of sunshine, the fourth sunniest November since the station started recording hours of sunshine. Accordingly, this month has been drier than normal for most of the province. Temperature and Precipitation

Throughout

the province, the temperatures for this month were closer to the October normals values than November's. All Ontario sites recorded higher mean temperatures than normal. The Northern locations broke records dating as far back as the 1940s,

by differences ranging from 3°C to 8°C.

In terms of precipitation, it has been a dry month. Most locations have recorded lower total precipitation than normal. The Sarnia weather station recorded very little precipitation, ranking it the second driest November in over a century. Kingston experienced its driest November since the 1930s. Records were broken throughout southern Ontario. Snowfall amounts were much lower than normally expected at this time of year, resembling the values observed last month. For the first time in recorded history, Toronto established a new record for a snowfree month.

Severe Weather

Traditionally, November is the month where most places in Ontario get their first taste of winter weather. In fact, the month usually provides some areas with numerous winter weather events. This is a month that sees the first of the significant lake-effect snow events, capable of giving large snow accumulations in short periods of time to regions to the east of Lake Superior, Lake Huron and Georgian Bay. This is also a month that can have massive storms that have snow, freezing rain and rain associated

with them as they move through the province. This month can have the first bitingly cold visits of the arctic air masses that will eventually dominate the weather picture as the fall gives way to winter. November 2009 delivered none of the above.

This November saw some snowfalls and periods of freezing rain but nothing noteworthy. The lake-effect snow engine never really got fired up and when precipitation did come in off the Great Lakes, it occurred as a mixture of rain, wet flurries and some ice pellets with no dramatic accumulations. In fact, in looking back at the archive of weather watches and warnings for the month, one weather warning was issued for snow squalls near Wawa and one weather watch was issued for snow squalls for areas near Georgian Both were Bay. issued on the last day of November. This is something very rare and almost unheard of for a normally active weather month like November. The most notable weather that touched a number of areas was fog. A number of Special Weather Statements were issued for locations all over the province for large areas of dense fog that developed and caused dramatic reductions to visibility.
