or any other type of reason as we cannot communicate with anyone. Unless you have a satellite phone, you are at the mercy of the elements. This is especially dangerous in the winter. We have no cell phone service. Because we are northerners, we don't qualify! It seems that all the new services are available only to the larger cities. Small towns in Northern Ontario are exempt from all the new high tech services.

In the community that I live in, the 89 residences and cottagers pay 50% of the cost to grade or plow the gravel road leading into our small town. Travelling during the winter is extremely dangerous. We are 150 miles from Sudbury and 100 miles from Chapleau. This must be done knowing that if we have an accident, we have no way of calling for help. Our roads are too narrow; no sanding is done during the winter months.

The same government who spends millions advertising for tourists to come and enjoy our pristine lakes and rivers does nothing to upgrade the roads to allow these tourists to reach their destination. Our snowmobile routes are in better shape than the road into a viable community. This community has four tourist outfitters that put millions into our provincial coffers, but we do not see any return on our dollars.

Our service providers are Chapleau, Timmins or Sudbury and it is a danger to drive to any of these larger communities. Even our paved highways are too narrow. It's terrifying to meet a transport truck or logging truck. For anyone travelling

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to the larger communities to see a doctor or buy groceries is a trip where we take our lives in our own hands to do what ordinary people can do without fear.

As northerners, we must get our MP's to start paying attention to those of us who live north of Parry Sound.

Why do we have to travel the Sultan Industrial road at our own risk while we are paying for the upkeep of this road with our taxes? We paid to build it and we

keep on paying and get very little in return. It's time for a change. Our major highways need passing lanes and widening of the shoulders. We need proper sanding and all gravel roads need yearly repairs and upgrading. We need a return of some of our tax dollars and to get rid of the MP's if we are not heard. Thank you for the space for this letter in your paper.

1181 Chapleau High School Cadet Corps performance described as "excellent" by Captain R.Q. Sims at annual inspection in 1946

Chapleau Moments ^{by} Michael J. Morris



On a beautiful sunny dOn a beautiful sunny day in May 1946, Captain R.Q. Sims, described the perform a n c e of 1181 Chapleau High School Cadet Corps as "excellent" during its first inspection following the end of World War II.

The inspecting officer delivered his remarks to the corps which the Chapleau Post described as "well earned praise following weeks of training" to company commander Foster Collings, platoon commanders John Thomson, Barbara Muske, Frances Hamlin, bugle band leader Janet Thomson, chief instructor and school principal John McClellan and corps members on the field behind the old high school on Pine Street.

The CHS cadet corps was established on November 14, 1924, just two years after a high school was established in Chapleau and was disbanded on January 1, 1963, and for 39 years was an integral and important part of school life.

One year after World War II had ended, thoughts would surely have turned to the more than 300 Chapleau citizens who had served in Canada's armed forces, including 17 CHS students who were killed on active service, and had been members of the cadet corps just a few years earlier.

As well as the actual inspection, demonstrations in signals, first aid, knots and lashes, girls PT, pyramids, rifle and precision drills were included in the day's activities.

Following the inspection, led by the Girls Bugle Band, the

corps would march around the community, before members would head home to prepare for the annual Cadet Dance, always part of the day's activities.

For some reason, I had assumed that the cadet corps always had a girls band, but once again I got a lesson in "never assume" as I have been researching the history of 1181 Cadet Corps. For example, I have discovered that in the

1934-35 school year it was called the Boys Bugle Band, and this may have continued until at least 1943 when student Milton O'Brien was the band leader. However, by 1946 it was a Girls Bugle Band led by Janet Thomson. It is also quite likely that it was a boys band prior to 1934, and as Chapleau Moments, as I have written before is really a very rough draft of history, I hope more information will be forthcoming so the complete story of the corps can be told.

Also, girls were not officially permitted to be cadets but at CHS they were involved and were part of the inspection. They were later approved.

After World War II, King George VI, granted the title "Royal" and they became the Royal Canadian Army Cadets. One of the more famous highlights in the history of the CHS cadet corps was the Royal Visit to Canada by King George VI and Queen Elizabeth in 1939. The story goes that while the Royals were not scheduled to make an appearance in Chapleau as the Royal Train was passing through the community at two a.m.

However, Chapleau reeve George Fife, the grandfather of CTV News Ottawa Bureau Chief Robert Fife, sent a message that he wanted to meet the King. So, the King was roused in the middle of the night to meet Mr. Fife, and according to Jim Austin, who was then a member of the CHS cadet corps, got off the train and conducted an inspection.

Many CHS cadets over the years attended Cadet camps, and 1946 was no

exception. Thirteen members of the corps attended camp at Niagara on the Lake, Ontario, which considering that CHS had about 100 students struck me as amazing. The Chapleau Post reported that those attending were Arthur Broomhead, Desmond Collins, Ross Hamlin, Coulton Henderon, Mike Mione, Arnold Moore, William Pellow, Lorne Riley, Douglas Swanson, Lawrence Tremblay, Bill Ritchie, Pat Serre and Reggie Sonego.

No cadet inspection day was complete without the dance held in 1946 in the Legion Hall which was decorated with white apple blossoms, the red, white and green school colours and **Cont'd on P.4**

crossed rifles on the wall panels, all "well deserving of praise" according to the Chapleau Post reporter. Lunch was served by a committee of staff members and parents headed by Mrs. McClellan, the wife of the principal.

Music was provided by 'The Modernes' in its first and only appearance even though the Chapleau Post reporter was gushing in praise of the orchestra, writing that it was "music played the way you love to hear it played" and predicting a great future for it. It folded as some members left Chapleau. Members were Marion Wedge, piano; George Payette and Jim Hands, trumpet; Greg Lucas, clarinet; Norman Cohrs, trombone; Bill Austin, saxophone; Jack Welch, electric guitar and Yen Hong, drums.

For almost 40 years of its history,

1181 Chapleau high School Cadet Corps played its important role. For some reason, I still recall the command "General Salute. Present Arms", the inspection by the army officer in attendance and the march past in review order as the Bugle Band played when I was a student at CHS in the 1950s. As the 90th anniversary reunion of CHS draws closer, I am sure there will be many revisions to the rough drafts of the school's history.

Florian Viau :Married Elsie (Robinson) Riley, my wife's sister, later gave up Railroading and turned to farming in Casselman Ontario. Florian loved 'La Vie En Rose', his favourite song. Always smiling. Chum McAdam:

Delivered for Smith and Chapples and at an early age, hired on as a locomotive steam fireman. Chum became a devoted student to all train movements. Chum remained a bachelor and often the CPR asked him to cash his pay cheques so they could balance their books.

Norman Kenney: His famous expression and he had many; "better here than hereafter" When the crew would decide not to make a close meet or run ahead of a passenger train. Norman always seemed to have new mitts. He was hanging around the CPR station as soon as he was able to walk. Cam Bell: a teacher

Cam Bell: a teacher who spent some time with his wife and family on the CPR School Car teaching children in the sidings between White River and Cartier. Cam was probably sharing supper in the Van during one of his moves. Note the "lace" tablecloth a standard table covering was news papers you could read and eat at the same time. I can not see the year on the calendar fixed onto the water tank.

Grant Somers: Here a young man later he would become a senior conductor. Grant was a Past Master of Lorne Lodge #622, Masonic fraternity and is sporting his ring in this picture.
