Chapleau reeve Terry Way-White created colourful totem pole from old log as project for Canada's centennial in 1967

While fishing at Seven Mile Lake in 1966, Terry Way-White, saw a pole at the bottom of the lake, dragged it out, took it home and put it in his basement to dry out.

In May, 1967, as Canada was celebrating its 100th anniversary as a nation, and after eight months work, Mr. Way-White and his friends who had helped him, raised a colourful totem pole at Chapleau's Centennial Park, on Monk Street.

Larry Carroll, Mr. Way-White's nephew helped him get the log home and

also occupied with the devastating forest fire of June 1967, when he had to give the order to evacuate the municipality. He served as reeve until 1973.

Included on the colourful totem pole were a thunderbird, bear, native spirit, Expo 67 Logo and the Centennial Maple Leaf. Also engraved were the Latin words, "Ad mari usque ad mare" meaning from sea to sea, which were emblematic of Queen Victoria's words apparently used when she chose Ottawa as Canada's capital, and was quoted as saying, "You shall have dominion from sea to sea."

Twenty-five years later, on July, Mr. Way-White, now retired from the Canadian Pacific Railway, was at the Centennial Park and the totem pole was cut down as the wood had been deteriorating for several years.

When it was placed in the park in 1967, Mr. Way-White had placed a time capsule in the base, however, over the years the glass jar had broken and some of the contents had been destroyed. In a glass jar were stamps, centennial coins, a Chapleau newspaper and a note from Mr. Way-White as reeve. Those salvaged were placed on display in the museum.

In an article in Algoma Hi-Rail, Marg Byer told about Mr. Way-White's project. He told her it was easy getting the log into his basement compared to getting it out.

"We had one helluva time getting the pole out. We didn't think about that once it was carved with wings and what not it was wider than before."

But they managed and the totem pole stood proudly in Centennial Park for 25 years.

In the same article Marg Byer also noted that Mr. Way-White was on duty with the CPR in 1939 when the Royal Train with King George VI and Queen Elizabeth on it arrived in Chapleau about two a.m. He noted that he had to wear a special armband and security was provided by the RCMP and CPR Police.

Since I wrote in a recent column about Chapleau Reeve George Fife paying a visit to the train to meet the Royals, it seems that Chapleau was awake for the early morning train stop.

Elizabeth Austin advised that her father Jim Austin was a member of the Chapleau High School Cadet Corps who were on hand for the visit, while June Marie (Charette) Charlwood wrote that her grandfather



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La réorganisation des comités municipaux – un pas en avant

En dépit de l'accent porté récemment sur des prises d'action maladroites de la part de certains conseillers, il faut néanmoins reconnaître le progrès légitime et honnête qui s'est fait par l'administration locale.

Récemment certains comités municipaux ont fait l'objet d'une revitalisation, dont le comité des Loisirs et des affaires culturelles. Regroupant des bénévoles et un membre du conseil municipal à titre consultatif, le nouveau comité se compose de Michael Levesque (président), la conseillère Lisi Crichton-Bernier (consultante),

Richard Beaudoin, Michel Fortin, Pamela Morin et Giselle Noël; Kevin Morris y assume le rôle de procès-verbiste.

Le nouveau comité se penche déjà sérieusement sur la formulation d'un plan d'action solide, en vue de traiter diverses questions de l'heure et d'améliorer les autres qui auraient été négligées sur le plan des loisirs. De plus, l'organisme veut être à l'écoute de la population et résoudre les différends soulevés par certains organismes et autres usagers. Chaque cas sera traité individuellement avec l'objectif d'y apporter une résolution équitable.

Le comité s'est fixé certaines priori-

tés, notamment l'élargissement de la programmation des loisirs, l'ajout de manifestations spéciales, la plage municipale, la planification de parcs, le musée et la promotion de notre patrimoine. La sécurité et la salubrité des installations de l'arena et de nos parcs figurent aussi au premier plan. Certaines lacunes constatées avec le 'Vault' ont été rectifiées, tandis que d'autres le seront sous peu. On envisage aussi des sondages d'opinion pour identifier les besoins en matière de sports et loisirs, et un meilleur système de communication avec les clubs philanthropiques et les autres prestateurs de

loisirs de la région.

"Trop souvent les gens affirment qu'un rêve est impossible, qu'on est voué à la faillite, que rien ne change. Quel piteux héritage à laisser à nos enfants et nos petits-enfants! Je crois fermement qu'il suffit d'avoir quelques bonnes idées et des gens déterminés qui s'engagent à s'y acharner jusqu'à ce que le tout porte fruit." dit Michael Levesque, président du comité lors d'une entrevue accordée avec le

Chapleau Express.

"L'enthousiasme est très fort et la réussite est assurée" ajoute-t-il.

Le succès est effectivement inévitable lorsqu'on constate un comité tel que celui-ci, oeuvrant sans intentions non déclarées, formé de bénévoles empressés de travailler honnêtement pour l'intérêt des contribuables. La reconnaissance des bénévoles, qui figurait au Plan directeur des loisirs et des affaires culturelles de 1988, devrait être ranimé.

Nous profitons énormément de l'apport de nombreux bénévoles qui acceptent volontiers de donner leur temps et leurs efforts au bien collectif.







Diabetes – What You Need To Know

What is carbohydrate?

Carbohydrate is one of the main sources of the energy we get from food. It is found in cereals, breads and pastas, fruit, juices, starchy vegetables (potatoes, yams, and corn), legumes, milk, yogurt and sweets.



When you eat carbohydrate, it becomes glucose (sugar) in the blood. For people with diabetes, if too much carbohydrate is eaten at a meal, extra glucose (sugar) stays in the blood. This extra glucose (sugar) raises blood sugar levels. This can cause health problems over time.

If you have diabetes, it is important to know how much carbohydrate is in each meal or snack that you eat. This information can help you stay within your blood sugar target ranges.

How much carbohydrate should I have at each meal?

A Registered Dietitian will help you plan the right amount of carbohydrate for you. Try to have a consistent amount of carbohydrate at each meal and snack. A safe starting point for most men is 60 to 75 g (grams) of carbohydrate and for most women is 45 to 60 g of carbohydrate per meal. Between meal and bedtime snacks will usually have 15 to 30 g of carbohydrate.

An example of a 60 g carbohydrate breakfast would be:

1 cup (250 ml) cold cereal	30 g
1 small banana	15 g
1 cup (250 ml) 1 % milk	15 g
1 poached egg	0 g
1 tsp non-hydrogenated margarine	0 g
Black tea or coffee	0 g
	60 g

An example of a 75 g carbohydrate dinner would be:

1 ½ cups (375 ml) cooked noodles or 1 large potato	45 g
Unlimited broccoli with 1 tsp. non-hydrogenated margarine	0 g
Green salad with low-fat dressing	0 g
4 oz (120 g) boneless, skinless chicken breast baked in oven	0 g
1 cup fresh blueberries	15 g
100 g container of low-fat vanilla yogurt	15 g
Black tea or coffee	0 g
	75 g

One-on-one learning is available for any child that needs it and the students benefit greatly from this aspect. Students with learning disabilities or students struggling with certain subjects get the care and extra help which they may need since teachers can identify learning issues that may be overlooked in a crowded classroom.

Many of the children that have transferred to Our Lady of Fatima from other school boards have noticed an improvement in many of the subjects that they had issues with and this improves the students' morale and self esteem greatly.

A lot of parents may feel that split classes may hinder the children's development but studies have shown that students who are in split classes do not suffer academically, whether they are in the lower or upper grades. There are many benefits to combining grades, including improved social skills, more collaborative learning and opportunities for students to be leaders in the class.

One of the great programs the school supports is a breakfast program that provides a variety of healthy and nutritional foods to help the students get their day started right. As parents we all know how difficult it can be to get our children to eat their breakfast in the morning and still get them to off to school on time. The breakfast program gives parents peace of mind knowing that

their children will not go hungry and they will get the boost of energy that a nutritious breakfast provides. Staff volunteers every morning to help out with breakfast and to make sure that no child goes hungry.

Parents and staff of Our Lady of Fatima are a very close knit family. Parents who become involved often go above and beyond to volunteer their time and energy helping out at school functions. Every year there are family BBQ's as well as Thanksgiving and Christmas lunches that are prepared by the staff for students and their families to enjoy together and promote family unity and build strong and long lasting bonds.

We encourage all parents of the community that may be interested in enrolling their children to contact the school, schedule a meeting with the principal and staff and see for themselves first hand how the children greatly benefit from the extra care and attention which they receive at Our Lady of Fatima. We are also extending an invitation to our next OPEN HOUSE (9-12 or 6-

8pm) on March 24th. We hope that we have enlightened you about our school and we hope to see you there,

APANO was formally incorporated in 1983, as a not for profit Aboriginal organization governed by a Board of Directors, that is dedicated to provide support and representation through programs and activities that meet the needs of our communities. We provide services for Metis, status First Nation, Inuit and non-status clients off reserve.

"Current funding allows the Friendship Centres to service just 25 per cent of the urban Aboriginal population and there are waiting lists for many programs, in particular for children and youth," says Sheila McMahon, the OFIFC's president. "We want the government to know what a tremendous success the Friendship Centres are in the Aboriginal communities and for Ontario, and we need their commitment of support to address gaps in service."

My primary responsibilities is to develop, provide, facilitate and/or co-ordinate a variety of local programming relating to reducing or preventing family and community violence, including community-based family violence awareness and prevention education campaigns or activities in local settings. (e.g. schools) or at local community events (e.g. powwows and health fairs). Implementing the lifestyles through culture based programming and healing. The program is client based, and responsible for identifying and assessing needs, referring, supporting, and promoting linkages amongst community agencies so that the Aboriginal community will have greater access to holistic healing and wellness approaches.

I have experience as a Registered Practical Nurse at Cedar Grove Lodge and Chapleau Health Services with Long Term Care and Advanced Foot Care. I worked as a Crisis Worker at Batchewana First Nation Woman's Shelter in Sault Ste. Marie Ontario and as a Registered Social Service Worker (Clinician) at the Child and Family Centre in Chapleau. These experiences have definitely helped me prepare for the position as the new Community Wellness Worker at APANO.

While it is sometimes hard to believe the actions of certain town councillors, it is even harder to believe that the reporting of said actions by the Chapleau Express has been viewed negatively by a few taxpayers. The newspaper is merely a reflection of what is happening in our community.

Chapleauites have been more than positive showing their support for the articles published. We received numerous telephone calls, thank you cards in the mail, emails and personal comments in the stores, the restaurants and on the streets. We couldn't even reply to all the messages left

on our answering machine. All inputs, except for a few, were positive in nature and we were congratulated. People need to know that as a small community in Northern Ontario, we are not immune to corruption. People have always been afraid to speak up, and to me that is worrisome; this is a democracy after all. Ignoring this type of behaviour is to encourage it. Newspapers should report facts, and unless gravely mistaken I am proud to say this was accomplished. To have been silent on these matters would have made the Chapleau Express and myself an accomplice to these wrongdoings. A few feathers may have been ruffled but in my opinion, if the hat fits wear it!

The integrity levels of certain

elected individuals, both at the local and federal level, have deteriorated to such an extent that our collective faith in them has diminished. We cannot stand idly by, content with the status quo. Whether you are a Member of Parliament and the Minister of International Cooperation, or a Councillor in a small local Township, you must be held accountable. If that means admitting your wrongdoings and dutifully resigning, then so be it. Where do we stand as a democratic society if we put up with corruption in our elected representatives, especially when all information regarding their wrong-doings is available to the public? With anticipation, we await their decisions. In the




