Snow Jammin Family Day at the Chapleau Best Start Hub



LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Like every law abiding Canadian citizen I was horrified by the goings on in Kitchener Ontario. If this kind of hysterical response can occur based on a drawing of a toy gun how many law-abiding citizens may face similar, unreasonable and illegal police-state searches?

A 4 yr. old girl in prekindergarten draws a picture of her Dad with a gun. She tells the teacher he is protecting her from monsters and bad guys. The teacher takes the

picture to the Principal. He calls the police and Children's Aid. The police arrest the guy at the school when he comes to pick up his kids at 4 o'clock. The CAS takes his kids. They try to take his baby from his wife who manages to call her Mom and have her Mom look after the child. Mr. Sansone is arrested and strip-searched. The police search their house without a warrant and find a plastic toy gun that shoots plastic pellets. Mr. Sansone

apparently owns no guns.

For a Canadian citizen to be subjected to this kind of police state hysteria without seemingly any reasonable grounds seems absurd. If teachers are co-parents, as the Supervisor for the Board of Education, has said. Why didn't the Principal do the common sense thing and talk to Mr. Sansone about the drawing? Calling in Children's Aid only compounded the hysteria and the response of the Waterloo Police force was unreasonable bordering on illegal.

Ruining a Man's reputation, harassing and embarrassing his family is inexcusable.

I have always believed in the rule of law in Canada. When did it become legal to arrest someone without reasonable grounds? When did it become legal to enter a residence and search without a warrant issued by a judge for reasonable grounds? If I take my grandson hunting groundhogs as my father and grandfather took me and he goes home and draws a picture, am I going to be subjected to the same police state hysteria?

Will I be subject to a search without reasonable grounds and no warrant? If you are playing Call of Duty with your child and he draws a picture at school is that grounds for an arrest?

It would be appropriate to provide Mr. Sansone with the financial wherewithal to hire the best legal council in Canada and on behalf of all law abiding citizens sue the Principal, the Children's Aid and the police in Kitchener for their abuse of power and unreasonable, hysterical handling of this fiasco. People should be

fired over this debacle, but none will be. We should at least try to make sure that common sense replaces hysteria and that the police follow the Rule of Law and protect rather than abuse law-abiding citizens.

The irony in all of this is that daily we see stories from Toronto where criminals with real restricted guns commit real crimes of violence. The legal system allows them out on bail to commit more crimes and fails to convict them when they do appear in court.



Gwen MacGillivray reflected that extra-curricular activities were the 'real heroes' at Chapleau High School with House System example of team spirit

Looking back at her years as a student at Chapleau High School, Gwen MacGillivray wrote that she realized that it was not the institution but the students and staff who made it "a valid source of community pride over the years".

Gwen, who graduated from CHS in 1980, was writing in a souvenir newspaper marking the school's 60th anniversary in 1982, but I am sure she was speaking for the vast majority of us who attended and/or taught at either the "old" school on Pine Street or the "new" school on the hill in its 90 year history. I am one of those who was a student at the old school and teacher at the new.

I was in touch with Gwen recently and she readily agreed that I could use her column written almost 30 years ago now -- and I was also able to extend best regards to her mother Joan (Simard) who was in the same class as me through Chapleau Public and High schools. Joan was a whiz in mathematics, and Gwen advised, "She still is".

Gwen noted that CHS students were "strong contenders in anything they chose to enter whether involved in science fairs, typing contests, sports of 'Reach For The Top', they always managed to put in a good showing".

When the new

school opened in 1966, historically the major team sport had been hockey with curling and at one point bowling as sports too. In its earlier years CHS also had very good track and field teams. High school hockey ended with the opening of the new building as it was the same year as the Chapleau Junior "B" Huskies commenced play in the International Junior "B" League and it of course recruited almost exclusively from CHS.

However, the new school also had a proper gymnasium, not as Ian Macdonald described the one in the Pine Street school, "A basement level gymnasium ... with a low ceiling height of approximately ten feet. The foundation walls... were whitewashed granite rubble with hostile surfaces quite hazardous to those attempting to play basketball

Gwen wrote that by 1980, CHS had won the NSSSAA Gymnastics Championship every year since 1973, and it struck me that with the new school a new era in high school sports had arrived too.

That won't seem like news to students who have been attending CHS for the past 46 years on the hill who have played on the various teams. It has been an integral part of their school experience, and much credit must

go to the coaches over the years, with a special nod to Ross Hryhorchuk, who established the school's sports and extra-curricular programs, and has greatly contributed to their success.

Boys' and Girls' Athletic Associations were established as well as a House System for extra-curricular activities and Gwen wrote that the school instilled a sense of "team spirit" and the success of the house system was a prime example.

"Talent played an important role in all the competitions and contests, but team spirit and the hard work of dedicated individuals was the major contributing factor .. and that's really what CHS was, and is... team work," Gwen wrote.

The school has produced excellent teams often at junior and senior girls' and boys' levels in gymnastics, volleyball, basketball, curling and soccer, and at one time also had junior and senior cheerleading squads. I won't even try to start listing the championships won by CHS teams, mainly because I don't know all of them, but I do hope that this part of CHS life can be recognized at the school's 90th reunion festival coming up soon.

As Gwen pointed out: "While the students could never be accused of lacking scholastic talent, the extra curricular activities were the real heroes of the time".

She also touched on the importance of other events during her time as a student from 1975 to

1980 like greaser day, winter carnival, initiation, and regular dances with live entertainment, all "a very big part of our education."


"Of course, part of our recreation included ribbing the teachers and frustrating the librarians, but it was all done in fun ... and accepted as fun, right

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Making a dream come true: mature student obtains high school diploma at 73 years of age

Surrounded by family and friends, Mr. Albert Lemaire recently celebrated a late, but great, achievement: receiving his Ontario Secondary School Diploma. With the support of Carrefour Options+ staff members, Albert was able to accumulate the missing high school credits he needed to graduate.

"We are all very proud of Albert's determination to finish his high school education and are thrilled at his success. This is

concrete proof that hard work and determination lead to good things," stated Carrefour Options+ director Mr. Jean-Pierre Durette.

Albert Lemaire is well known for his contribution to the community and for his volunteer work with youth, the handicapped and seniors. Since 1985, he has been the full-time deacon at the St-Joseph Parish in Chelmsford, where he contributes to the spiritual well-being of his community. This adult learner is also appreciated for his



volunteerism with the Société St-Vincent de Paul, where he helps in collecting and managing donations. In addition, Mr. Lemaire participates in renovation and maintenance work for his parish and for Chelmsford's Club 50, is a member of the Knights of Columbus and contributes actively to a number of charitable organizations.

The demands of caring for a chronically ill or elderly loved one are often very challenging. Respite care offers individuals a much needed break from the workload of being a caregiver.

What is Respite Care?

Respite care provides planned, short-term and time-limited breaks for families and other unpaid caregivers of adults in order to support and maintain the primary care giving relationship. Clients being admitted to Respite Care must be able to return to their previous home to qualify for admission.

Is Respite Care provided by Services de santé de Chapleau Health Services (SSCHS)?

Yes. Respite Care is a service provided by SSCHS to relieve caregivers who are caring for a family member who might otherwise require permanent placement in a facility outside the home. This service allows the caregiver to attend to other responsibilities, travel out of town or simply just give the caregiver a much needed rest.

How many respite care beds does Services de santé de Chapleau Health Services have?
SSCHS has two Short-Stay Respite Care beds.

How does an individual become eligible for a Short-Stay Respite Care bed?

The following criteria must be met for an individual to be eligible for admission to SSCHS Short-Stay Respite Bed Program. The person must:

- Be 18 years of age and older;
- Be insured under the Health Insurance Act;
- Have care requirements that can be met in a Long-Term Care Home;
- Have a caregiver who requires temporary relief from his or her caregiver duties;
- Require temporary care in order to reside in the community and is likely to benefit from a short-stay respite;
- Be able to return to their place of residence within 60 days.

What services are offered?

Clients in Respite Care will be monitored and cared for by medical staff. They will be able to participate in activities such as congregated dining in the Dining Room, and get involved with the Activation Department to participate in activities such as games, crafts, and attend social events.

What is the cost of a short-stay Respite Care bed?

The cost of a short-stay respite bed is \$34.63 per day.

How many days can a Respite Care bed be utilized?

Clients will be authorized for admission for a maximum stay of 60 days at one time, if needed, and can stay in Respite Care for a total of 90 days in a calendar year.

What is the application process?

To arrange for a client to apply and be assessed for the Short-Stay Respite Bed Program, the Timmins Community Care Access Centre must be contacted to complete an application. The toll free phone number is **1-888-668-2222**.



Myth "Multi grain is the same as whole grain" : **THE TRUTH:** Don't be fooled by marketing. Multi-grain isn't

always whole grain. Multi-grain products include different grains, but they may not be whole. You'll get the greatest health benefits from eating whole grains. To make sure a food is made with whole grains, look on the food label's ingredient list

for the words "whole grain" in front of each grain name. If whole grains are the main ingredients in a food, they should appear first in the ingredient list. Make at least half of your grain products whole grain each day.

Myth "If you eat too much sugar, you'll get diabetes": **THE TRUTH:**

You will not get diabetes from eating sugar. It's wise, however, to limit your sugar intake. Foods that are high in sugar, such as cookies, candies and soft drinks, are often low in nutrients and high in calories. Diets with too

many calories can lead to weight gain, and being overweight is one of the main risk factors for type 2 diabetes. Other risk factors such as family history, age (40 and older) and ethnicity also play a role. You can reduce your risk of developing type 2 diabetes by eating a healthy diet,

maintaining a healthy weight and being physically active.

Myth "The % Daily

value on the nutrition facts table is not very useful" **THE TRUTH:** The % Daily Value (%DV) is useful for anyone wanting to make healthier food choices. You can use the %DV to see if a food has a little or a lot

of a nutrient. You can use it to compare products and make a better choice. For example, you might want to choose a product with less fat and sodium, and more fibre, iron, vitamin A and calcium. An easy rule of thumb: 5% DV or less is a little, and 15% DV or more is a lot for any nutrient.

Everyday items double as cleaning supplies and spot removers

Finger Smudges

Fingerprints disappear from walls with a piece of stale white bread. Add a few drops of water and lightly rub until the marks vanish.

Tile Grout

Remove dirt and grime with white, non-gel toothpaste. Dab on grout and scrub with an old toothbrush or denture brush. Wipe clean with liquid dish soap and water.

Stainless Steel

To make stainless steel appliances shine, add some baby oil to a microfibre cloth and wipe with the grain. Buff with a dry microfibre cloth to remove any excess oil.

Jewellery with Precious Gems

Place the jewellery overnight in a container of club soda. In the morning, rinse in water, pat dry and watch your gems sparkle.

Tomato Sauce Stains
