n Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, seminars were held to enlighten future entrepreneurs as to the procedures to follow in order to qualify for the upcoming new entrepreneur funding program announced by the province.

Representatives from East Superior Development Corporation and the Ministry of Development and Mines were on hand to explain and answer any questions pertaining to the necessary steps including business plans and bridge financing needed in order to qualify for the grants.

The grants are available to any resident of Northern Ontario who plan to start their own forprofit business in the North as long as the new venture is not an expansion of a similar business owned by the entrepreneur and or a relatives. The proposed business must operate full-time

and result in job NOHFC within the creation.

If you did not not attend the information sessions you can still get information by contacting Denis Rochon at the Northern Development and Mines office in Chapleau.

Grants of up to \$125,000 are offered. In certain cases up to \$500,000 can be available.

The entrepreneur will be required to reimburse the NOHFC for selling assets financed by the first 3 years of operation. Following each year of operation, approved applicants will be required to submit a report to the NOHFC out-lining the economic benefits of their project including revenues and job creation.

Dear Premier McGuinty:

Two years ago I wrote to the Honourable Kathleen Wynne, Minister of Education, with regards to the announcement of March 19, 2007. "Three New Grants Are Latest Improvements To Funding Formula". Specifically I referred to the intention of funding a minimum of 14 teachers at the secondary school level and 7.5 for the elementary. This appeared to be an acknowledgment by the Ministry of Education that there is a minimum level of program that should be available to all students in Ontario. To the best of my knowledge this funding is still in place. At the very least, the intent to provide a minimum program in Ontario high schools must be. With this in mind I again find it disturbing to discover that the Algoma District School Board has once again reduced the staffing at Chapleau

High School, an isolate school in Northern Ontario which has just over 100 students.

When a school is about to be closed the public that is affected is allowed to have some input. At the very least they are informed. When a school program is destroyed one teacher at a time there appears to be no need for this courtesy. If there is a teacher reduction in a large urban community there are ramifications. A grade nine math course might be reduced to four classes instead of five. There might be only three sections of a University level grade twelve math course. The students still have access to these credits. In a small school there are only two options. One is to combine classes. Place grade 10 applied math with the grade ten academic math so both are "taught" at the same time by one teacher. This is hardly the most conducive environment for learning. It is hard for the teacher and definitely places students at a disadvantage. I do not argue that it can be done but this is neither fair to the

students nor their parents. The second option is to cut program. This could be the loss of a course offering or a special education section. Again this is not conducive to excellent education or, it appears, to the Ministry's intent for minimum program availability. It is definately not in keeping with the Government's intent of "making student achievement their top priority".

A staffing level of fourteen teachers means that there would be eighty-four sections available in any school with over seventy-two students. This is to meet the needs of all credit courses, special education and student success programs. By reducing the staffing level at Chapleau High School to eleven teachers there are only sixty-six sections available. The school is

sections fewer than the Ministry is funding. One can only imagine the impact the addition of eighteen new sections to the curriculum would have. Yes, class sizes would be small but the students would have the opportunities available at other schools within the board and in Ontario. They would have the opportunity to take required courses for college and university entrance from classroom teachers. They might even have what are called "optional" or "elective" courses. With only sixty-six sections these become the only credits available at that grade level so they can hardly be called optional.

Another question that must be asked is that if the Algoma District School Board is being funded to place fourteen teachers in Chapleau **Cont'd on P.3**

High School and there is to be only eleven teachers then where are the other three? The answer must be that they are in the other schools within the board. In addition to this another small school within the board, Horne-payne High School, will have only nine teachers next year. This means that there is a total of eight teachers within the board that should be in the small schools but have been placed in the larger schools. One simply cannot draw the conclusion that this is in the best interest of the students or the communities in question.

Where does the Ministry of Education stand in all of this? They are providing funding for fourteen teachers and subsequent program but are not making sure that it is being provided. When I drew this to the attention of the Minister of Education two years ago I received no reply. Perhaps at that time I was considered to be a disgruntled employee. I have since retired but more than ever I am

disturbed at the unfair way that the students in small, isolate schools are being treated. I am worried that the intention of the Algoma District School Board might be to drop the level of instruction at Chapleau High School to that of Hornepayne. Will we eventually be facing having only nine teachers? What will that do to program? Students might expect that classes with small enrollment will be cut and they will be required to take credits through online programs or independent studies through the Independent Learning Center. It takes a special student to be successful with this type of learning. They must be mature, self motivated and excellent independent learners. They must have a high level of reading and writing skills. These students tend to be those in the academic and university programs. Would this mean that there would be fewer grade eleven and twelve university level credits available at Chapleau High School?

What would be the impact on those students seeking post-secondary education? Is this the best way to prepare them for it? There are a lot of unanswered questions. Indeed one must also consider the impact that a school with such a limited program will have on the decision of workers to locate in those communities. At a time when we are trying to make the community as attractive as possible this is hardly helping.

It is time for the Government, specifically the Ministry of Education, to decide once and for all the minimum program and level of sections that is necessary for a fully functional high school and convey this information to the communities. Yes, small schools are expensive to run and those in remote areas are a burden to the boards that they belong If boards cannot to. afford to operate those schools at a level of function that is best for the student then perhaps it is time the Ministry of Education remove the schools from the affected board. There is precedent for this. In Hornepayne, two elementary schools are operated by the "Hornepayne Roman Catholic School Board". They are not associated with a mega-board that is hundreds of kilometers away. They operate as a School Authority much like the elementary school in Foleyet. The English language elementary school under the Hornepayne Roman Catholic School Board has 49 students, 5.5 teachers, 4.5 education assistants and .5 The

language teacher, .5 vice-principal and .5 special education teacher. There are no education assistants. This is hardly an equitable situation. It is time to examine schools like those in Hornepayne and Chapleau and either have them operate as school authorities or even make a special organizational board of remote schools. At the very least, perhaps it is time for the Ministry to get first hand information of what programs are available in small schools and how the students and teachers are coping. It is starting to appear to me that in this time of advanced technology, statistic gathering, e-filed reports and testing that the Ministry is losing touch with the very schools and students that they are funding. There used to be monthly visits and

inspections by representatives of the Ministry of Education who had an excellent idea of what was going on in our school and what the funding from the Ministry was actually being spent on. I do not believe there has been a representative of the Ministry of Education at Chapleau High School since the amalgamation of school boards by Mike Harris.

After dedicating thirty years to the students of Chapleau High School I know first hand that small schools have immense learning opportunities to offer the students but the resources must be there. In these years of technology experience has demonstrated that the best resource is still the classroom teacher. It is time to stop cutting the program of small schools and the oppor-

tunities of the students registered there.

In closing I urge you to direct the Ministry of Education to have a representative visit isolate schools to see just what is going on. I believe that if they were to visit Chapleau High School they would be impressed with what the teachers and students are doing with limited resources and also understand the need for an improved program.

Supporters stand behind local skater Brown announces more medical school spaces in Northern Ontario School of Medicine

Mike Brown, MPP, Algoma-Manitoulin, is pleased to announce that the Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM) will boost the number of first year medical students by eight students in 2010-11.

NOSM will also receive over \$1.6 million to buy additional equipment and to create space and equip off-site training locations in the community.

"By training more medical students in our community. we're helping to ensure we will have the doctors we need for the future," said Brown.

This is part of the government's commitment to improve access to doctors by creating

100 new first year spaces at five medical schools over the next three years.

Ontario must train more doctors, and the Ontario government is helping meet that demand by adding 100 new first-year medical spaces at our medical schools. We're creating more opportunities for medical students to train closer to home, connect with the local medical community and prepare for careers where they study."

By 2011, the government will have created 260 new first year medical school spaces, a 38 per cent increase since 2004-05.

Ontario's six medical schools will welcome 952 first year students when the all

of the new seats are added by September 2011.

New spaces are being created at five medical schools and nine locations. In 2006, Ontario announced new community-based medical education campuses in Kitchener-Waterloo, St. Catharines, Windsor and Mississauga to train doctors in more communities and improve access to health care across the province.

The province is investing \$35 million over three years to help medical schools build the specialized rooms, labs, and equipment they need to train our future doctors.

Great idea - no money

It's the entrepreneurs' lament. For want of a little startup financing, the world could be missing out on the next, better mousetrap, ultra computer or low-cost, non-polluting fuel source.

So, how does someone with a good business idea find the money he or she needs to get started?

"Before you leave your job to launch that new business or idea, set up a personal line of credit with your bank," advises Chartered Accountant Daryl Heinsohn, a partner with Laberge Venne & Partners Professional Corporation in Sudbury. "It's a lot easier to get a favourable decision about financing when you're employed and have a regular income."

Depending on your circumstances and your idea, a line of credit may be enough to start. But if you still need to ask the bank for a business loan, do some

serious homework first. "Start by putting together a business plan," says Chartered Accountant Daryle G. Moffatt, vice-president, operations, with Probyn & Company Inc. in Toronto. "Many banks have outlines for business plans on their websites, so don't reinvent the wheel. Spell out what you're planning to do, where you want the business to go and the costs associated with it. Explain how the company will be structured. Will you be self-employed or set up a corporation? Identify the key players. Will you have partners? Is it a joint venture?"

"Banks can be a tough sell for business startups," says Heinsohn in Sudbury. "Aside from term loans, generally don't count on financing from them for two or three years without a personal guarantee. In addition, they'll definitely want to see that you have some of your own money in the venture. I tell clients to be prepared to be turned down, but don't take it personally. Work with your banker and build up rapport.

"There are a few other sources of money," Heinsohn explains, "but not many grants or subsidies these days. However, if your business is conducting research and development, you may be eligible for certain federal and provincial incentives."

Consider, too, the Business Development Bank of Canada, a federally-owned bank that works with small to medium-sized business. "They can sometimes offer flexibility that exceeds what traditional banks can accommodate," Heinsohn explains.

Friends and family can also be a source of help, but there can be major pitfalls involved in those types of deals. Loans that aren't repaid can cause ill will. Think seriously before you risk damaging any relationships.

Whoever you decide to approach for money, both Moffatt and Heinsohn agree that your first call should be to a Chartered Accountant. They will review your business plan and help determine if that idea of yours really has legs. There's no better substitute for the expert advice they can give you about how to structure the business and best prepare yourself for that meeting with potential funders.
