## Progress in Game Preserve projects

A gathering set for last Thursday was the public's opportunity to see what's in store to make this community a more visible entrance to the Chapleau Crown Game Preserve.

Invited to the public meeting were local officials and Algoma-Manitoulin MPP Mike Brown, as well as consultants on the project for the Chapleau Regional Development Corporation, (CRDC) which has been working on plans for the development of the Game Preserve as a major tourist attraction.

Brown's partici-

pation confirmed the contribution of approximately \$235 thousand by the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund. Other funding for the total Game Preserve project includes approximately \$150 thousand from FedNor and \$115 thousand from the Township of Chapleau. The local saw mills also contributed to the project.


Much of the interest last Thursday was centered on the design of the entrance structure, to act also as a welcoming center with washroom facilities and information on the Preserve.

A massive, 40

foot tall concrete structure is planned as the physical entrance to the Game Preserve, which was established by the province in 1925 at the urging of Chapleau resident William McLeod as a means to encourage the beaver population in the province. With no hunting allowed, the Game Preserve has become a rich habitat for many species including bear and moose.

"In 1999 our township began the pursuit to develop the potential of this game preserve to attract world travellers who would enter this land through the community of Chapleau at the gateway to the largest game preserve in the world," said Chapleau mayor Earle J. Freeborn in remarks prepared for Thursday's event.

"This identification has put Chapleau in the forefront as an eco-tourism

destination."

The plans for the Preserve, developed by the CRDC includes wildlife viewing stations and other centers of interest.

Already underway is a pilot project for a wildlife viewing station developed by Four Seasons' Guiding of Chapleau. Also, it is the intention to partner with First Nations

communities for additional tourism and tourism education services.

Chapleau has, for many years, billed itself as the entrance to the Game Preserve, and apart from a few highway signs over the years, and a declaration on Township letterhead, the plans unveiled last Thursday provide for the first

physical evidence of this.

"We have something in our own back yard which is marketable," stated Richard Bignucolo, chairman of the CRDC. "The opportunities are great," he said, adding "we have only scratched the surface."



## Fight for regular air service not over

Chapleau is not yet ready to give up on finding someone to provide a scheduled air service.

That was the consensus of a discussion during last Monday's regular meeting of the Township Council. The community, along with several others in the region, have been left without a service for some time, and it now appears the latest company to propose a service is no longer

interested.

The municipalities involved in the consortium for an air service include Chapleau, Wawa, White River and Manitowadge.

A meeting of the Mayors and Reeves Group which represents those communities was told nothing has been heard from Niigani Air, a company based in Thunder Bay which had previously expressed an interest in setting up an air service linking



them to the south.

In a report to Chapleau Township Council last Monday evening, deputy mayor Bud Swanson, who attended the last meeting of the Mayors

and Reeves Group said it has sent a letter of inquiry to Niigaani Air, but received no reply after three months. "We took that to mean they are not interested," reported deputy

mayor Swanson. It was reported the company had been unable to secure government financial assistance. It was also suggested the municipalities subsidize the airline, however deputy mayor Swanson pointed out the company had initially stated it would operate the service without a subsidy.

Although the other municipalities indicated little interest in keeping the issue on the Mayors and Reeves Group agenda, Mayor

Earle J. Freeborn indicated at the council meeting he wanted it back on.

In an interview following the council meeting, Deputy mayor Swanson said he felt an air service linking the region's communities is necessary. "We've got to keep the airports alive," he stated.

"Economic development depends on an air service to some extent," he concluded. The mayors and reeves group meets monthly.

## One welcome sign for service clubs proposed

A request by one organization has prompted the township council to investigate a single highway sign indicating service clubs in the community.

The matter was discussed at last week's regular meeting and was prompted by a request from Masonic Lodge which wants permission to erect a sign on the highway entrance into town. The metal sign would measure 28 inches by 23 inches and be similar to others

in about 400 communities in Ontario.

While considering the request, the council supported the proposal by Mayor Earle J. Freeborn to invite all service groups and organization in Chapleau to discuss the idea of a single sign on which logos and information could be affixed.

Councillor Andre Byham said he liked this idea and a resolution by deputy mayor Swanson and councillor Richard Bignucolo supported the proposal as well.

## Gardening from the ground up

### Mulch Ado About Nothing

Mulching can be a complicated business, because the word "mulch" is used for different things that we put on a garden for different reasons. To simplify matters, winter mulch can be divided into two categories: mulch to be left on, and mulch to be taken off.

There are three main reasons for applying mulch to a garden: to stop weeds from growing, to nourish the plants, and to provide insulation from winter cold. The main purpose of a winter mulch is to provide insulation, though if it is left on the garden through the spring and summer, it can also feed the plants and discourage weeds. A mulch that is to be taken off the garden in spring is used only for winter protection.

Not all plants need to be mulched for the winter. Plants in raised garden beds are more

prone to being frozen, and will benefit from some extra care. Plants that are exposed to winter winds are also good candidates for mulching. Trees and shrubs that have just been planted this year should definitely be mulched, as should any plant rated to climate zone 4 (check the tags on your perennials for the zone rating or minimum temperature). If a tree or shrub has been heavily pruned this fall, it is a good idea to use a mulch around it that can be left on for the summer.


If you intend to leave winter mulch on the garden in the spring, the best materials to use as mulch are manure, compost, or a mixture of both. These will break down into the soil over the summer and provide nutrients for the plants. Use well composted material; it should be black and crumbly. Manure that is too fresh will promote rather than

inhibit growth of weeds.

Because manure and compost are rich in nitrogen and other nutrients, if they are put on the garden too early in autumn they can cause the plants to produce new growth, which is prone to frost damage. It is best to wait until there have been a couple of good heavy frosts before mulching.

For plants that prefer acid soil, such as Hydrangeas, Rhododendrons, and Azaleas, use pine needles as a mulch to be left on. The pine needles will lower the PH balance of the soil as they break down.

If you plan to remove the mulch from the garden in the spring, you can use sawdust, shavings, straw, leaves, or any such insulating material. Leaves and wood shavings can be difficult to remove, but if you put newspaper down first, then pile the mulch on top, you can easily lift



it all off in the spring. All of these materials should be removed once the snow has melted.

Whether it is to be left on or taken off, and regardless of the materials used, the method of applying winter mulch is always the same. It should cover the area of ground where the plants' roots are. For trees and shrubs, the ring of mulch should be about as wide as the spread of the branches. Clear the mulch away from around the stems to avoid stem rot. Mulch carefully around Irises; they don't like having their rhizomes (thick roots near the soil surface) covered. Heap the mulch on to a depth of at least four inches to keep your plants well insulated against the winter cold.




to better control its own destiny delivering much needed stability to Ontario's industry.
