Brown re-elected in a Liberal majority

ike Brown, MPP for Algoma-Manitoulin, won a sixth consecutive term in last night's general election.

"I would like to thank the many supporters and volunteers, from across the riding, who worked so hard, from Manitouwadge to Killarney," said Brown. "But I would most like to thank the voters of Algoma-Manitoulin for once again placing their trust in me. It continues to be an honour to serve everyone in this riding at Queen's Park."

Mike and supporters gathered last night at the Curling Club in Espanola to celebrate the election victory.

"Now we can keep moving forward



here in Algoma-Manitoulin, to build on the progress we have already made in education, health care and building stronger communities." said Brown.

Brown was reelected in the October 10th provincial election with 11,500 votes to NDP candidate Denley's 9,853.

Brown was most recently Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Natural Resources and chaired the Cabinet Committee on Education Policy. He also served as a member of the Legislative Committee on Justice Policy. On October 11, 2005, the 1974 to 1987. Honourable Michael A.

Brown was elected as Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario.

Mike was born in Sarnia, Ontario and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in history from the University of Western Ontario. He subsequently earned a diploma from Humber College of Applied Arts and Technologies.

Prior to entering provincial politics, Mike was the deputy mayor of Gore Bay and President of the Manitoulin Municipal Association. He managed a small business and worked as a funeral director on Manitoulin Island from

In opposition, he was the Liberal critic for Seniors Issues, Natural Resources, and Northern Development and Mines. In October of 2003 Mike Brown was elected to the Ontario Legislative Assembly for a fifth consecutive term. First elected in 1987, he was also mandated by the people in 1990, 1995 and 1999.

Adding Family Day to the calendar would give Ontario workers and families a total of nine statutory holidays per year, putting the province on par with Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia.

In addition, although not recognized as a statutory holiday under the Employment Standards Act, the first Monday in August is observed as a civic holiday in many O n t a r i o municipalities.

"I can think of no

better way for our government to get to work than by rewarding Ontarians for all their hard work, and for their belief that when we work together, build together and dream together, there is nothing we cannot accomplish."

Premier McGuinty also pledged to continue working hard on behalf of the people of Ontario as his government begins its second mandate.

"We will continue to move forward,



together. And moving forward, for our government, means that we must work as hard, care as deeply and dream as vividly as the people we are privileged to represent "he said.

"We live in the greatest province in the most blessed country in the world," said McGuinty. "We have made great progress, together, in the past four years and we know we have more to do in the next four years."

OPP impounds 175 vehicles during Operation Impact

/CNW - The Ontario Provincial Police impounded 175 vehicles and seized 175 drivers' licences over the Thanksgiving Week as part of Operation Impact, Commissioner Julian Fantino said.

"The new legislation allowing us to seize a car and the driver's licence is a powerful tool that will help all police services combat speeding, street racing and aggressive driving, F a n t i n o s a i d.

"Unfortunately, too many motorists still don't believe we will take their car and licence if they are caught doing more than 50 kilometres over the posted speed limit or if they are making unsafe turns, racing and doing wheelies on a motorcycle as well as other dangerous manoeuvres.

"They're quickly finding that we will. We're unrelenting. We're not going to give up. We're going to do whatever it takes to change people's inappropriate driving habits, one dangerous driver at a time if that's what it takes."

The OPP has i m p o u n d e d 269 vehicles and suspended 269 drivers' licences since the legislation (Bill 203) came into effect Sept. 30.

Friday afternoon, a motorcyclist was clocked at 210 kilometres per hour in a posted 100 kph zone on Highway 400. He passed an OPP cruiser doing 180 and then sped up when police gave chase. He was finally stopped when he collided with a cruiser at the Highway 7 exit. He faces numerous charges and had his motorcycle and licence seized.

In western Ontario, **OPP** aerial surveillance tracked one motorist driving in an aggressive manner, making unsafe lane changes, tailgating and cutting off other drivers and speeding. He was charged with careless driving and also received a 12-hour licence suspension for failing a roadside breath test. He was one of six motorists who had their vehicle impounded in the Chatham-Kent area.

One motorcyclist that was stopped has 30 convictions, 21 for speeding (one of those was for doing 164 kph in a 100 kph zone), one for no insurance, one for careless driving and one for driving while h is licence was suspended.

Yesterday, an SUV weaving in and out of traffic on Highway 400 southbound rolled when the woman driver lost control, sending the driver to hospital and her passenger to a Toronto hospital with l i f e - t h r e a t e n i n g injuries. The highway was closed for several hours during the height of the afternoon traffic returning from cottage country. The vehicle and the driver's licence were seized under the new legislation.

Overall this year, 361 people have been killed on roads the OPP patrols, compared to 343 last year, a 5.2 per cent increase. Of that total, excessive speed was involved in 111 of the deaths, up from 89 last year, a 24.7 per cent increase. Non-use of seatbelts resulted in 99 deaths, up 33.8 per cent from the 74 deaths in 2006. Alcohol played a part in 65 deaths, a 41.3 per cent increase over 2006 when 46 people had died in alcoholrelated crashes.

Four people died on highways patrolled by the OPP over the long weekend, compared to five last year. There was one marine death this year, none in 2006 and there was one ATV fatality this year, as opposed to none in 2006.

In addition, the OPP laid 5,087 speeding charges, 619 hazard moving violations, including careless driving, 506 seatbelt violations and issued 1 2 7 1 2 - h o u r suspensions over the three days.

Ministry of Transportation inspectors took 196 vehicles out of service, laid 138 charges and removed the plates from 65 vehicles over the weekend.

"The OPP is working hard every day to change the driving public's behaviour and get people to slow down, wear seatbelts and not drive aggressively," Chief Superintendent Bill Grodzinski, Commander of the Highway Safety Division said. "Unfortunately, some still aren't getting the message so until they do we will continue to use all available resources, including impounding vehicles and seizing drivers' licences for up to seven days."

The OPP annually participates in Operation Impact, a C a n a d a - w i d e campaign aimed at making the nation's highways the safest in the world. The Thanksgiving Weekend traditionally is one of the busiest on Ontario highways, trails and waterways as people head to cottage country for the final long weekend of what is referred to as the summer driving season.

Operation Impact is supported by the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police and Transport Canada and is part of Road Safety Vision 2010, which has a goal of making Canada's roads the safest in the world by 2010. It is also part of the OPP's Provincial Traffic Safety Program.

Flax is also a green alternative to many solvents and petroleum-based chemicals. The seeds produce a vegetable oil known as linseed or flaxseed oil, which is used to manufacture linoleum flooring, drying oil in paints and varnishes, coadhesives in fiberboard, as well as nutritious foods.

Flaxseed oil is rich in omega-3 fatty acids and lignans, which have a number of nutritional health benefits and even contain anti-cancer properties.

Flax is also quite valuable for its fibre, which is soft, lustrous, flexible and stronger than cotton. The best grades of flax fibre can be used to make linen fabrics, while coarser grades are used for manufacturing twine and rope.

Hunter suspended for four years for lying about shooting a protected bird

CHAPLEAU Timmins man, who shot a bald eagle, has been suspended from hunting for four vears.

David Castonguay, 30, was convicted of making a false statement to a conservation officer about evidence found at the scene of a bald eagle shooting.

Court was told that on October 6, 2004 Chapleau Ministry of Natural Resources conservation officers responded to a report of an injured eagle. Ministry staff sent the bird to an animal hospital but it died of complications. Xrays showed shotgun pellets in the bird. Investigators used forensic evidence to determine that Castonguay was

A lying when he denied shooting the bird. He had been hunting small game in Foleyet Township at the time the bird was shot.
